

WHAT IS DOLLY PARTON'S IMAGINATION LIBRARY (DPIL)?

In 1995, Dolly Parton launched an exciting initiative to benefit the children of her home county in East Tennessee. Her dream was to foster a love of reading among her county's preschool children and their families by providing them with the gift of a specially selected book each month. She wanted children to be excited about books and feel the magic that books can create, and to ensure that every child would have access to quality books, regardless of their family's income. This initiative is now a national and global program managed by the Dollywood Foundation and brought to our local community by United Way of the Lakeshore.

HOW IT WORKS:

All children under the age of five residing in Muskegon, Newaygo, or Oceana Counties are eligible to participate. Each month, every registered child receives a free, high-quality, age-appropriate book through the mail, continuing until the child turns five years old. Imagine every child having their own library of 60 books by the time they go to kindergarten!



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History

Thanks to generous donors like Kathy Evans, the Morgenstern Family, the Muskegon County Great Start Collaborative, Country Dairy, and all those who donated through the Nichols "Matching in March" campaign, we are able to bring this wonderful program to families in Muskegon and Oceana counties.

Kathy was awarded the Patricia B. Johnson Award for Community Leadership and Innovative Grantmaking in 2014, which included an Impact Grant from the foundation to the nonprofit of her choice. She chose United Way of the Lakeshore, using the funds to help launch the Dolly Parton's Imagination Library program in our community. The Morgenstern children and grandchildren made a donation to United Way of the Lakeshore in honor of Richard and Nancy Morgenstern as a Christmas gift that same year. This generous donation was also used to help establish the Dolly Parton's Imagination Library program. A grant from the Muskegon County Great Start Collaborative rounded out the initial funding to get the Library up and running. With their help, we were able to start a pilot program for children age birth to five in Holton and Muskegon Heights.

In 2017, Nichols generously offered to match up to \$25,000 in donations during March is Reading month, raising nearly \$50,000 to expand the program! In 2018, Nichols generously offered another match - up to \$35,000! Thank you, Nichols, for your continued commitment to our littlest learners.

We are so grateful for the support of those who understand the importance of having this program in our community!




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Logic Model




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Growth Of Program Overtime

Muskegon




4,685 Children are currently enrolled in Muskegon County. That's 44% of the eligible children in Muskegon County.




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
Survey

United Way of the Lakeshore conducts a survey every year in March with the parents enrolled in the program. The following pages are examples of testimonials and calculated metrics based on the data.


276 parents participated in the 2020 survey.



How Many Years Has Your Child Been In The Dolly Parton's Imagination Library?




How Many Children Do You Have Enrolled?





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BEFORE joining the Dolly Parton's Imagination Library, how many times per week did you read with your child?

91% of children in the program look through books to pretend to read! This is great creative growth for children as they make up stories to go along with the pictures and words!



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92% of surveyed parents reported that the Imagination Library through United Way of the Lakeshore helped prepare their child for kindergarten!

"Providing a wide array of books to support his learning of colors, numbers, etc, and expand his imagination beyond the four walls of our house. 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Supporting School Readiness

Strong, productive communities are dependent upon a skilled workforce that can compete in a global economy. To build those skills, it is critical to reach children early—even before they start school. Once a young person falls behind it can be very difficult to catch up. **Recent Kids Count data shows that 60% of Muskegon and Oceana County third graders are not reading proficient.** We can change those statistics for our kids and our community. Kids who are lucky enough to have the proper resources and support early on will have the skills needed to succeed. Kids learn to read by third grade, then they read to learn. Making sure they are reading proficiently by third grade sets them on a solid path for all future learning.

United Way of the Lakeshore is committed to building an educated workforce, starting with quality early literacy programs, including making Dolly Parton’s Imagination Library books available to all children 0–5 to help children learn to love reading. Early literacy proficiency will help change the odds for kids in school and careers.

To honor that commitment, we are continuing emphasis on early literacy and parent education supports, especially for at-risk families. In 2003, the High Scope Research Foundation compiled a comprehensive literature review of a history of studies which all came to the same conclusion – the single most important activity to prepare a child for a life of learning was to read frequently with the child, preferably every single day.

United Way of the Lakeshore piloted Dolly Parton’s Imagination Library (DPIL) in Muskegon Heights and Holton Public Schools in 2015 to support the READ EARLY READ OFTEN initiative; DPIL is now available across Muskegon and Oceana Counties.





Goals & Outcomes:


Short-term goals: have parents sign-up to have monthly books mailed to children between the ages of birth and 5 – especially those at-risk populations including families at or below the federal poverty level, and ALICE families.

Medium-range outcomes: increased kindergarten readiness; reading proficiency by the end of 3rd grade; alignment with classroom instructors, reading tutors, and mentors through our Lights On! After-School Programs, school stations, and tutors affiliated with the Retired & Senior Volunteer Program, and other education support programs.

Long-range outcomes: a ready workforce with reading proficiency; college and career ready youth who succeed, so they are able to add to the tax base, rather than the tax burden (Chase & Diaz, 2015); mitigate child care needs for ALICE families through high-quality after-school programs.
