The Muskegon Livability Framework summarizes the community's goals related to creating a system that ensures livability for all Muskegon County residents. The Livability Elements (in blue) represent what people need to thrive and prosper in Muskegon County. The Community Conditions (in orange) represent what needs to be in place across the county to promote the Livability Elements and achieve the Vision.

Livability Elements

Education

Residents of all ages have knowledge and skills needed to thrive.

Metrics to Track Progress on Education:

Health

Residents are experiencing holistic health and well-being.

Metrics to Track Progress on Health:

Economic Opportunity

Residents are prospering and financially stable.

Metrics to Track Progress on Economic Opportunity:

Safety and Security

Residents feel safe and secure at all times.

Metrics to Track Progress on Safety and Security:

& Trust

Residents and local settings have relationships that demonstrate a sense of belonging, loyalty, trust and responsibility.

Community Conditions

The Community Conditions and Root Causes listed below were identified from local conversations with 300+ individuals as well as local and national datasets/reports. Additional details are available in the individual Community Condition handouts. These lists are a starting place and do not include ALL potential root causes!

Access to Learning Environments	High-quality learning environments within local schools, organizations, and families are accessible to all.	Root Causes Getting in the Way of Access to Learning Environments Not enough quality preschool slots available in county School funding not evenly distributed across the county School of Choice policies unintentionally disadvantage some schools Some schools struggle to attract and retain quality, diverse teachers Some schools lack capacity to meet needs of students experiencing trauma Some education settings not effectively engaging families
Child and Dependent Care	Safe, trusted, affordable, dependable, high-quality child/dependent care is accessible to all who need it.	Root Causes Getting in the Way of Child and Dependent Care Some employers lack policies related to childcare and family time off to support workers with children Insufficient number of high quality child care slots available in community Child care is not affordable for many families
Countywide Collaboration and Alignment	Local groups and settings are working together to ensure efforts are coordinated and integrated.	Root Causes Getting in the Way of Collaboration and Alignment Lack of a shared vision and goals for system coordination Lack of processes and policies promoting coordination Many stakeholders lack awareness of continuum of local programs/services Need for more effective infrastructure to support coordination Need for more effective power sharing and inclusive decision-making
Health Care Access	Affordable healthcare supports to meet all physical and behavioral health needs are accessible to all.	Root Causes Getting in the Way of Health Care Access Healthcare services and prescriptions not affordable and accessible for many residents Limited insurance coverage is a barrier to accessing healthcare Not enough local health/mental health providers & substance use treatment options to meet demand Some local residents and organizations lack awareness of how to access health services Some local policies/practices prevent residents with addiction or mental health concerns from getting their needs met; leads to incarceration instead of treatment Local stigma around accessing needed substance use or mental health supports Many local residents, providers, and decision-makers lack understanding of trauma and how to address it Need for stronger community culture around promoting health





Community Conditions (cont'd)

Housing and Utilities	Affordable, safe, and healthy living environments are accessible to all.	Root Causes Impacting Access to Affordable, Safe Housing/Living Environments Limited supply of affordable housing for low to moderate income residents Lack of affordable housing located in safe neighborhoods Housing costs increasing faster than wages/income Long waiting lists for assisted housing Affordable, subsidized housing is unevenly distributed across the county Some housing & rental policies/practices disadvantage residents with temp jobs, eviction histories, limited financial capital, or other perceived "risk factors" Limited incentive for housing developers to work in blighted areas or build affordable housing Not all landlords held accountable for maintaining quality standards
Livable Employment Opportunities	Local employment opportunities adequate to meet basic quality of life standards are accessible to all.	Root Causes Getting in the Way of Livable Employment Not enough local jobs in Muskegon Not enough available jobs provide sufficient income Some companies hire employees through temp agencies, reducing access to full time employment with benefits Some companies' hiring policies not aligned with new laws legalizing recreational marijuana use in Michigan
Neighborhood & Natural Environments	Vibrant community spaces, high-quality infrastructure, and thriving outdoor landscapes and waterways are accessible and safe for all.	Root Causes Getting in the Way of Neighborhood and Natural Environments Some neighborhoods experiencing high levels of prostitution and drug activity Lack of adequate community-informed police presence in some neighborhoods Some neighborhoods experiencing blight, deteriorating roads, lack of street lights Many neighborhoods are highly segregated in Muskegon County Some neighborhoods lack safe, social gathering spaces to promote social connections
Transportation	Affordable and dependable transportation is available at the right time and the right place, for all who need it.	Root Causes Getting in the Way of Transportation Transportation routes do not extend to all of Muskegon County Transportation times not meeting the needs of all Muskegon County residents
Workforce Development	Opportunities to secure skills and resources for economic and personal growth are accessible to all.	Root Causes Getting in the Way of Workforce Development Not enough diverse, quality training opportunities aligned with available jobs Some post-secondary/career training opportunities are available, but students not prepared Limited education and accessible loans to promote small business/entrepreneurship Limited education on financial literacy
